

My Message - By Reb Tuviah



Shalom, Shalom!

How wonderful it is to be a part of the Jewish faith, especially during this most meaningful season! The holidays begin and end with introspection and celebration; we welcome the Jewish New Year of 5783 and commemorate the birthday of the world (Rosh HaShanah), we spend a full day fasting and repenting for our misdeeds (Yom Kippur), we give thanks for the fall harvest and build rickety shelters as a metaphor for

the fragility of life (Sukkot), and finally, we rejoice with the Torah (Simchat Torah) as we roll it all the way back to the very beginning and the story of Creation.

If I had to summarize the Jewish High Holy Days into one statement, I would say that they are a time during which we have an opportunity to hit our "reset buttons" and begin with a blank screen. Jews are required to review their deeds through a process known as Cheshbon haNefesh, an accounting of the soul. It is an opportunity to evaluate the past year and to take responsibility for the ways in which we fell short of living up to our potential as human beings; in which we may have "missed the mark." It is also a time during which we ask forgiveness directly from those whom we have wronged during the course of the year and to promise we will make every effort to not commit the same offense again. Apologizing is never easy but it can go a long way in healing relationships and taking weight off of our conscience. As you know, during the High Holy Days, we try and mend our relationship with God, which may have suffered over the course of the year. But this is also a time to work on our other relationships as well. We can ask ourselves – have we been the best parent, grandparent, great-grand parent, child, sibling, friend that we could have been?

As I conclude this High Holiday message, I'd like to leave you with an exercise that I hope you participate in and truly take to heart. Here's the exercise:

Find a childhood photograph of yourself. Look at it deeply and quietly for a period of time. Then ask yourself, "Would that child be proud of the adult you have become?" Why and/or why not? Bring the answers to that question with you into our sanctuary during these next few weeks and be prepared for some deep, meaningful, and most insightful results.

I wish you all Shana Tova u'Metukah, a Happy and Sweet New Year!


this month...The very first day of Tishrei is Rosh Hashanah, the power of the shofar calling our soul to awaken. From

I bless us all with the humbleness, honesty and courage to spend time looking deep within, to forgive those who have wronged us and to forgive ourselves, to sit with the discomfort of birthing something new, in order to have a complete teshuvah and bless our community with our true, divine being!

I wonder if other members or friends had the opportunity to preview our new Machzor for the Days of Awe. I was inspired by some words of wisdom from Rabbi Laura Geller that I would like to share with you. "Your Book of Life doesn't begin today, on Rosh Hashanah. It began when you were born. Some of the chapters were written by other people: your parents, siblings, and teachers. Parts of your book were crafted out of experiences you had because of other people's decisions: where you lived, what schools you went to, and what your homes were like. But the message of Rosh Hashanah, the anniversary of the creation of the world, is that everything can be made new again, that much of your book is written every day—by the choices you make. The book is not written and sealed; you get to edit it, decide what parts you want to emphasize and remember, and maybe even which parts you want to leave behind. Shanah Tovah means both a good year and a good change. Today you can change the rest of your life. It is never too late."

On behalf of Temple Beth El's Board of Directors, my family, and myself, I would like to wish everyone a year of health, happiness, and prosperity, and may we have a year of peace and security in Israel, the United States, and all around the world.



Tax Planning and High Holiday Giving

If you have appreciated stock in any publicly traded company, you can donate the stock to Temple Beth El. You may be able to deduct the current market value from your 2021 taxable income as a Schedule A deduction without paying capital gains tax. The Temple can then sell the stock and use the funds to continue our good work.

Tax year 2021 appears to be the last year that most taxpayers can take up to a charitable cash contribution to a non-profit organization (such as Temple Beth El) directly from adjusted gross income. This "above the line" deduction is limited to \$300 for taxpayers filing as single, head of household, qualified widow(er)s, and married filing separately. Taxpayers filing joint returns are limited to \$600.

As in all things tax-related, there are exceptions and additional rules. Each person's situation is unique. Please check with your tax preparer to be sure. These are general suggestions only based on publicly available information.

An Easy Way to Donate to TBE

Most of use have a dish where we collect coins that fell into our pockets or purses. Please consider donating them to the Temple's "Pushki Fund." One hundred percent of the coins donated will go to the Temple's general fund and help us fund on-going operations. We will acknowledge your donation by letter and, if you itemize deductions, you can use the amount to lower your tax bill. Just put the coins into a sturdy plastic bag along with a note with your name and address. Leave the bag on the Temple's desk in the office the next time you come to services. We'll take it from there.

This month's Article of Interest!

King Charles III and the Jews

With the passing of Britain's beloved Queen Elizabeth II at age 96, the longest serving monarch in the United Kingdom's history, her eldest son Prince Charles has become Britain's newest monarch. Here are six facts about King Charles III, Jews, and Israel.

Circumcised by a Rabbi

King Charles III has something in common with thousands of British Jews, he was circumcised by Rabbi Jacob Snowman (1871-1959), a brilliant physician and one of London's leading *mohelim* (Jewish ritual circumcisers). It's widely believed that the tradition dates back to the early 1700s, when Britain's King George I – who was born in Germany – imported the custom of German noblemen to have *mohelim* circumcise their sons, though some have disputed this account, claiming that this royal practice is far newer. It's unclear why this became a tradition, but some speculate that their extensive experience reassured anxious parents that their sons would be safe during the procedure. Charles' mother Queen Elizabeth wanted only the best for Charles, so she turned to Rabbi Snowman, who was well known in London's Jewish community.


Visiting Israel

Unlike Queen Elizabeth II, who never visited Israel in all her long years on the throne, her son Charles has made trips to the Jewish state. One emotional visit occurred in 2016, when he travelled to Jerusalem for the funeral of former Israeli Prime Minister Shimon Peres. While there, Charles visited the grave of his grandmother, Princess Alice of Greece, who saved Jews during the Holocaust and was named Righteous Among the Nations by Yad Vashem. She is buried in Mount of Olives in Jerusalem.

Born in 1885, Princess Alice was the great granddaughter of Britain's Queen Victoria. She married Prince Andrew of Greece and moved to Athens with her new husband. She was intensely unhappy. A religious Christian, Alice watched as her husband drifted into a life of dissolution. With the rise of Nazism in the 1930s, her three daughters all became ardent Fascists and married Nazi officials. Only her son Philip, King Charles father, defied Nazism, moving to England and fighting with distinction in the British air force during World War II.

Princess Alice remained at home in Athens alone; her husband had long since left her and was completely devoted to a life of drinking and gambling. During the Holocaust, Princess Alice invited a Jewish family she was friends with, the Cohens, to move into her apartment with her. Her building was next to the Gestapo's Athens headquarters, and Princess Alice was even brought in for questioning at one point, but she refused to divulge the fact that she was sheltering Jews.


